The Saline-Ellsworth Counties School Readiness Project (SECSCRP) works to support parents, grandparents and early childhood programs to give at-risk children 0-5 a healthy start. Through an evidence-based family mentoring program, the SECSCRP is building supportive relationships and stronger foundations for at-risk families. This project will also prepare at-risk children ages 0-5 for success in kindergarten by strengthening teacher-child interactions, identifying delays earlier, and monitoring growth and development through quality classroom participation stipends, and coaching for early childhood educators.

#### **Project Abstract**

Child Start Early Childhood Connections program requests \$187,388 to supplement existing funding for ASQ, IGDI, myIGDI, and CLASS assessments for 18 licensed child care facilities both center and in-home within Harvey, Butler & Sumner Counties. Each of the licensed child care facilities will receive 6 mini learning experiences. We will host 4 community events to connect families, and providers with child development-based community organizations. There will be 12 peer meeting events that provide networking, discussions, additional training, and awareness for both providers and parents within the programs. We will focus on increasing capacity and awareness of the importance behind the ASQ assessments; therefore, increasing early intervention opportunities within Harvey County. CLASS Tool and associated Technical Assistance (TA) completed with caregivers will result in improved child-to-caregiver interactions. Finally, by using the outcomes from all assessments, we will provide centric observational learning through Mini Learning Experiences. We have the potential of impacting ~225 children.

#### **Project Abstract**

Realizing that no one program or group can meet the demands of early childhood development in at-risk families, Families and Communities Together, Inc., a non-profit organization, partnering with Marion County Early Childhood Task Force, created the "It Takes a Village" Early Childhood Collaborative (ITAV) which serves children and families throughout Marion County. This initiative collaborates programs and organizations to create the greatest benefit for Marion County children and families. ITAV offers evidence-based services to at-risk children (birth-age 5) and families by providing coordinated perpetual supports including early childhood screenings, mental health observations and consultations, parent educator training, conscious discipline parenting training, childcare provider professional development, and preschool scholarships. ITAV focuses on early childhood issues while raising public awareness with the consistent goals of ensuring healthy holistic development, ensuring strong familial support, and ensuring early learning. ITAV is requesting \$198,385 for this project to continue serving 250+ pre-school aged children.

The proposal requests is \$1,861,888 and includes six counties in extreme Southeast Kansas: Allen, Bourbon, Cherokee, Crawford, Labette and Neosho. Our programs will serve ~735 at-risk children and their families. Our early learning (age 0-3), preschool (age 3-5) and home visiting programs are the elements that drive most of the strategies and touch all three areas of impact as outlined in the Blueprint for Early Childhood: Healthy Development, Strong Families and Early Learning. These strategies are designed to provide access to services for at-risk children and families, to utilize existing and new public/private partnerships and to use evidence-based strategies to ensure quality of service. Developmentally appropriate interventions will be identified based on the assessed needs of the individual child and their family/caregiver(s). Coordination of services and heightened supports during critical transitions across programs and as children enter kindergarten will ensure that children and families are confidently prepared for school success.

## **Project Abstract**

Four County Mental Health Center, Inc's (FCMHC) Early Childhood programming provides critical services and supports to the regions' most at-risk children and families, serving Chautauqua, Cowley, Elk, Montgomery, and Wilson Counties. FCMHC requests stable funding of \$472,209 to continue the following programs in FY2025 with only minor changes. Project Before Case Management and Parent Education provides support, education, skills development, and linkage to resources needed to provide stable nurturing environments. Mental & Behavioral Services and Classroom Consultation provides direct treatment to children and education for parents, teachers, and child service providers on promotion of good mental health. The programs provide stress-reducing supports, connect families with community resources, facilitate treatment, and improve parenting skills which increase protective factors and decrease potential for adverse experiences. In FY2025, these programs will serve ~135 children (0-5), ~130 families, pregnant mothers, ~50 families through Parent Education, and ~43 individuals will receive professional development.

Growing Futures requests \$510,642 to cover costs of one preschool classroom to serve 16 children (ages 3-5) living up to 185% of the federal poverty level in Johnson County, Kansas; continue staff retention pay for our high-quality staff; offset costs of another increase in health insurance premiums; and cover costs of a full-time Family Educator who provides support and education through our Home-Visiting Program. We must keep the classroom open for children living just above the federal poverty level to give them access to an education they otherwise would not get, leading to improved social, emotional, and academic performance as they prepare for kindergarten. The FE will bring these same opportunities into families' homes, improving access to our services. All other requests improve staff recruitment and retention to ensure our center remains open and continues to provide quality services to the ~219 children and their families who need us the most.

## **Project Abstract**

Six programs facilitated by Smart Start Northwest Kansas, under the direction of LiveWell Northwest Kansas requests \$496,634 for an estimated 259 high-risk children ages 0-5 and their families living in 15 Northwest Kansas counties spanning over 13,000 square miles. Strategies include risk screening, health education, home visiting, parent education, and early learning, and referrals to additional services. Outcomes include social-emotional development; strong families that provide safe, stable, and nurturing relationships; and early learning to ensure children enter kindergarten ready to learn. FY25 funding will continue to meet the needs of Northwest Kansas families by continuing its regional outreach to include fourteen counties. The current service model will continue that includes six programs: Attachment, Bio-behavioral Catchup, Play and Learning Strategies, Behavioral Health Services, PreK and Early Learning Infrastructure, and Kids Port. Strengthening community referral systems and co-constructing new partnerships will be integrated into the service model.

## **Project Abstract**

Phillipsburg Child Care Center requests \$100,911 to provide early education services for approximately 50 children ages 6 weeks to 5 years to improve Kindergarten readiness. We plan to utilize grant funds to focus on early education from birth to age 5. Grant funds will help increase pay for lead teacher in the pre-K classroom to recruit employees that have obtained a form of higher education related to early education. Grant funds will provide incentives for teachers that score well/improve scores on their CLASS Observations as motivation to improve interactions with students. We will also provide classroom consultation for our teachers to improve social emotional development or behavioral health education and provide coaching/consultation for teachers for stress management and to prevent burn out. We recognize the high turn over in staffing for child care and early education and hope to help improve staff resiliency and long term employment.

Raising Riley (RR) collaborates with families and communities establishing robust foundations, offering tailored, high-quality services for children and families. This funding will cover personnel wages, benefits, and childcare scholarships for eligible at-risk families and children. USD 298 and the community has benefited from the implementation of a learning center that services birth to 3 year old children and expansion to all day 3 and 4 year old preschool. These services would impact approximately 46 birth to 4 year old children in our community. The demographics of our community have shown the need for increased academic and social/emotional learning in early childhood development. We continue to see the early learning center and all day preschool for 3 and 4 year old children has helped build a platform for these students' future success. We predict that these additional services will reduce the need for remediation in the primary grades due to kindergarten readiness.

It also aims to break the cycle of poverty in our community. USD 445 requests funding renewal to offer universal early childhood services through an integrated approach to serve the whole child and meet the needs of families. This is accomplished through early educational experiences to prepare children for their next educational setting.

Furthermore, a specific focus on social-emotional learning contributes to a strong foundation. Social-emotional learning is supported through developmentally appropriate classroom environments, where teachers engage children in meaningful activities, provide substantial time for child-focused learning, and create structure with predictable schedules, routines, and rules. Lastly, the Coffeyville Model for Early Learning is a community-based approach enriched by both public and private partners offering their expertise and funding.
