

## Career Pathway Comprehensive Workforce Study

Brenda Bandy introduced Stephanie Parks and Patty Peschel from Kansas Child Care Training Opportunities (KCCTO). Stephanie Parks, Associate Director at KCCTO, presented on the Career Pathway Comprehensive Workforce Study. This study, funded by federal recovery dollars through the Kansas Department for Children and Families and as part of the "All In For Kansas Kids" strategic plan, aimed to establish a baseline understanding of the Early Childhood Workforce. The study also involved collaboration with the Educational Innovation and Evaluation team at Kansas State University.

The study group sought insights from both current professionals and those who have left the Early Childhood care field. The study covered nearly 6,000 Early Childhood care professionals across all 105 counties in Kansas. For this meeting, the group focused on data from 4,696 individuals currently working in the field. Additionally, four key findings and potential recommendations were discussed. Below is a brief overview of these key findings.

#### Kansas ECCE Workforce Study Participation by County





 ECCE professionals enter the field because they are passionate about the work with children (overall rated 4.5 on a scale of 1 to 5).

All In For

 FCC professionals urgently need support, particularly in securing adequate salaries, benefits and retirement preparation, as many face retirement with minimal savings.

## • Key Finding #2 Compensation and Benefits

 Low wages create severe hardships for the ECCE workforce and impacts recruitment and retention.

## • Key Finding #3 Higher Education and Professional Development

 Education levels among FCC professionals vary widely, with nearly twothirds having some college or higher degrees. There is significant interest in advancing their education, though focus groups expressed concerns about the return on investment.

## • Key Findings #4 Supports for ECCE Workforce

 ECCE professionals in Kansas provide care and education to young children and families within a complex, mixed-delivery system and need supports across agencies/departments.

## National Breastfeeding Month Activities

Brenda Bandy presented on behalf of the Kansas Breastfeeding Coalition in recognition of National Breastfeeding Month. August is National Breastfeeding Month, a key time for raising lactation awareness. Highlighting Kansas, recent data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention show a significant increase in breastfeeding rates. Kansas is ranked 4th in the nation for the rate of infants exclusively breastfeeding at three months and 5th for exclusively breastfeeding at six months. - The Governor of Kansas has proclaimed August as Kansas Breastfeeding Month.

- Breastfeeding support is integral to early childhood care. This support plays a vital role in the well-being of breastfed infants.
- Child Care Aware of Kansas recognizes child care providers who support
  breastfeeding families and employees through the Breastfeeding Friendly Child

- Tanya Koehn shared a few bright spots on behalf of Child Care Aware of Kansas.
   They have hired a full-time executive director, and she also previewed an upcoming development: the launch of a new Business Support Center on their website, set to go live within the next week. This resource will provide guidance for businesses interested in entering the early childhood field, offering ideas and a roadmap for getting started.
- Malissa Martin provided an update from SparkWheel. Last month, she announced that they will be implementing two new SparkWheel early childhood programs: one in Neodesha, Kansas, and the other in Cheney, Kansas.
